The Beginning

The opening ceremony of OakridgePMUN 2022 began with speeches by the chief guest, Mr. Rohan Krishna Ravi, a Public Policy professional at the National Institute of Urban Management and by the principal of Oakridge International School Gachibowli, Ms. Hema Chennupaty. Following the introduction of the Executive Board and the opening of the conference by Ms. Hema Chennupaty, the delegates dispersed to their first committee session.

As the committee session began, the Executive Board of the committee discussed the Rules of Procedure and the agenda. The delegates then proceeded to pass a motion to set the agenda 'combating worldwide religious extremism and terrorism,' as well as to establish the General Speakers List.

Post lunch, the delegates had an unmoderated caucus in which they discussed possible moderated caucus topics and what they wanted to discuss further through formal debate. This was followed by a press conference where the delegates were asked questions by the International Press. The press conference gave the delegates an opportunity to clarify the statements they made in their earlier speeches as well as to elaborate on the points and ideas they had previously spoken about.



Following the press conference, the delegates raised a motion to move into a moderated caucus on the topic 'the origins of terrorism,' where they elaborated on how each country was affected by terrorism. The delegates also discussed a few possible solutions to prevent or curb the rise and growth of terrorism. They then moved into an unmoderated caucus where they discussed more moderated caucus topics relating to the problems pertaining to the agenda. The delegates then entered a moderated caucus on the topic "nuclear weapons' effect on terrorists" where the delegates discussed their countries stances on nuclear weapons.

In conclusion. the delegates spent the first day of the conference understanding the agenda, the stances of the delegates and the important issues that need to be focused upon in the following committee sessions.

By listening and understanding.


Points and plans galore,

They gain all that an MUN teaches...


